The Cumbria Honey Show was held at the Braithwaite Institute on Sunday 3rd November 2019 and was attended by 38 enthusiastic beekeepers from around the county. Twenty four people entered the Honey Show and there were a total of 63 exhibits covering most of the classes in the show schedule. All these numbers were up from previous years which provided encouragement to the organisers with the hope that this will be a continuing trend in the future. Christine Matthews, an International Honey Judge, having just returned from judging at the Apimonda, was our judge for the day. As it is a County Honey Show, Christine expected a high standard and unfortunately there were one or two

classes where the entries failed to comply. However, Christine was very fair with her judging and explained why some exhibits were not awarded a first prize. With a little extra care taken when preparing for the show, and after all it is a food product, all entries



would have been eligible for a prize.

This year there were two extra trophies to be awarded, one donated, on the day, by Alan Tett, so that last minutes alterations had to be made to the Show Schedule to accommodate this generous donation. in the Honey classes. This is now for the Best Exhibit in Class 2 for two jars of medium honey. The trophy donated by Alan Tett is a tankard and it was decided that this will be called the Alan Tett Cup, to be awarded to the Best Exhibit in the Beginners Class.

The W. Barton Cup which used to be awarded to the Best Exhibit in the Beginners Class will in the future be awarded to the Best in Classes 18-19 Mead.

Whilst the Honey Show was being judged Julia Hoggard, the regional Bee Inspector for Cumbria, gave an interesting talk on "Wasps and Hornets, Friend and Foe". This took the meeting up to lunch time when everyone enjoyed a light lunch of soup and rolls whilst having a good crack with fellow beekeepers. Many thanks to Val Sullivan, Marie Gregory and Sara Barnes for preparing the soup and rolls and all their hard work in the kitchen serving the food and washing up. Following lunch the Conference Session, chaired by Walter McPhee, took place and Branch Reports were heard from, Carlisle, Cockermouth,



Keswick, Penrith and Whitehaven. The Afternoon talk was presented by Dr Dorian Prichard from Northumbria where he has kept bees for the past 40 years. Dr Prichard gave an enlightening talk on "How Native Bees Resist Varroa". Among many favourable attributes, the native honey bee is virtually completely resistant to varroa mites! The

combination of ways by which it does so is unique in the bee world and took several years to unravel. The secrets being revealed by a hybrid colony that was uncharacteristically slow to react to mite infestation. The explanation required novel analysis of data, investigation of forgotten research reports and a bit of imagination, and offers new insights into the unexpected resources honey bees can call on when their colonies are threatened with imminent extinction. As a result Dr Prichard has never treated his colonies with chemicals and has found that by breeding Native Bees they can recognise cells that have varroa in them and clean them out. He has successfully used this method for many years and always has healthy colonies of bees. After this second talk there was the presentation of awards.

Cumbria BKA Assets for Loan

Over the years Cumbria Beekeepers have collected or bought items for loan to the Branches, mainly from two sources.A grant from the CO-OP community fund and items from the amalgamation of "The Cumberland Show Group" with Cumbria BKA.

The items can be mostly categorised into three groups.

1. Mostly used for Agricultural Shows.

A Marquee 3x4.5M aprox. in black and yellow, display materials including model hives, display boards, county banner, 5 frame nucs with observation hive extension, much more practical than the vertical brood frame and super as of old.

2. Items for Bee Analysis.

Two microscopes and a digital eye piece to transfer the microscope image onto a computer screen, really useful during a disease identification session or pollen search.

3. Miscellaneous Items.

Grading glasses for honey shows, a laptop, projector screen and mike.

We did have a projector but the bulb expired and was too expensive to replace, would a new LED projector be useful?, let us know if you would have use of such.
